## Falling Leaves

As we enter the last months of the year, we begin to take on new tasks on the property. Obviously, leaf clean up is a big part of what we will be doing on our visits. This year, we have the ability to completely remove leaves from the property using our blowers and leaf vacuum. This allows us to remove nearly all the leaves on your property and haul them out of sight. We will also be pruning limbs on trees to allow more sunlight beneath the tree.

## Fall Planting: Plan Ahead

This is a great time to plant trees and shrubs. More importantly, bulbs for daffodils and tulips need to be planted so they can be enjoyed in February and March.

We will continue to apply pre-emergents to prevent spring germination of weeds. Turf aeration helps to loosen the famous red Georgia clay and brings on noticeable results. Also, during the month of December lime can be applied to assist the soil and turf.



## Current Watering Restrictions?

Property owners can water between 4PM and 10AM seven days per week. Watering of newly installed landscapes is allowed any time of day, 7 days per week for 30 days. Hand watering with a hose end shut off any time

per day, 7 days per week. We learned during the drought that Pansies and Violas performed better. Perhaps we were over watering, which we can keep in mind for these types of flowers.
